OCP Review Public Meeting

On May 1, approximately 60 people gathered at Manson's Hall to partake in the kick-off of the Official Community Plan (OCP) Review. A pretty good turn out given we were competing with a hockey game! Of those present 75% had read the entire OCP bylaw. Carlos Felip, Manager of Community Services and Lisa Gallo, Planner, facilitated the meeting. Lisa presented a power point slide presentation explaining what an OCP is and an overview of the review process.

A lot of time was spent discussing how Steering Committees should be formed—whether they should be based on geographical location, current OCP policies or individual areas of interest. It was determined that these committees will be based around the three population areas: Manson's Landing (Manson's Lagoon, Hague Lake, through to the South Tip of Cortes), East Cortes (including Cortes Bay, Seaford, and Squirrel Cove), and Whaletown (from Thunder Road to Coulter Bay). This structure will help alleviate folks driving back and forth across the island. The work these Steering Committees will undertake also received significant discussion. The committees will decide where and how often to meet and choose people to fill necessary functionary positions (chair, recording secretary, and RD contact person.) They will gather information for baseline studies and review the current OCP to determine what's good and if anything needs to be added, deleted or changed. Each committee will focus on the entire island and document. The committee findings will be presented to the island in an open public meeting when summer has ended. ***These committees will not be drafting any policy.*** Regional District staff will supply the committees with the material and information the RD has and offer technical assistance as needed.

Please remember, this process is to review and update the OCP. It is a time for everyone to familiarize or refresh himself/herself with the document. The OCP bylaw states in **A Time for Reflection** as found in the Plan Objectives on page 2-5, that we are “to encourage local residents to express their comments on the Island's land use planning matters and the OCP's implementation” and we are “to review the plan periodically so that it may be adapted to changing social, economic, and environmental conditions.” If

you have not yet read the OCP, please do. Each and every one of us should know what exactly the OCP says—don't rely on someone else's understanding of it. ***Community involvement is essential throughout the entire process. PLEASE GET INVOLVED!***
